It seems as if the Lord is continually reminding us to remember who "I Am" and what "I do" and have done for you because of who "I Am". It is natural to ask: Why these frequent reminders to remember? The answer is that God, knowing humanity perfectly, knows how quickly and how easily we tend to forget. Since a strong and vital faith is built on constantly remembering both God's nature and His deeds, neglecting the discipline of remembering deprives us of much faith-sustaining encouragement. Since our past is littered with signposts of God's enduring faithfulness to us, we need to be people who always remember never to forget!

- Hopeful events often occur in dark times. Has God given you encouraging, even joyful experiences during your dark times?
